Summary for Non-Academic University Employees (University of Alberta, Edmonton, AB)





Note: We grouped the responses to this question into 5 categories and calculated the percentages based on total number of respondents who answered the question.



Representative sample of comments:



2 indicated that they only like romance when it's written by women 1 indicated that they prefer the female perspective

Representative sample of comments:

Males don't write good romance novels.

I like to read novels about women by women. I prefer women characters to be written by females as I don't like the way males write female characters.

Of the 17 respondents who said NO

15 indicated that they do not see a difference between male and female writers or that content is more important than gender of the writer

2 indicated that they like a variety of perspectives

I'm more interested in the subject than the gender of the author. There are quality authors of both genders.

Each person has an interesting opinion and style of writing.

I don't mind either way. If the writing is interesting and well-written, I don't even notice the gender of the writer.



In what languages do you read?







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Additional comments (selected sample):

I do a lot of reading but unless I have read a book from a specific author or an article from a specific writer, I can't say that I choose a specific piece of writing according to the writer. It's always dependent on the topic of the writing itself.

I rarely read novels or books. Usually just the local newspaper each week. On occasion when I have read books, they are Birth Order books, family psychology type books or about Wayne Gretzky or Lance Armstrong.

Many of the "yes/no" questions were hard to answer so simply. For example, I do not care if an author is Canadian or not but that fact will influence whether I read the book or not. This is not due to a preference for Canadian authors but rather for authors to whom I can relate. It is the same regarding female or international authors. Does the fact that these factors influence my decision mean that I care? Maybe it's just an argument of semantics. To be honest, although I do not care about these factors it should be noted that I read next to no writing by female authors. This is the same with international authors (if by international you mean other than Canadian, American or British) . . .
